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"A seed refuses to die when you bury it; that is why it becomes a tree."



CAS activity 'Deeply Seeded', for IBDP students, was organized by Sanskar School. Students decided to make a 'seed bomb' in this activity. It is a technique of planting trees by embedding organic seed balls in the ground. It is also known as aerial reforestation.

Vegetation can be introduced to any land by throwing or dropping seed balls in the ground. The best time to execute this process is raining season.

Students of IBDP Year 1 & 2 started working on it in
July. They gathered information about the various
natural vegetation, which is local and sustainable in our
regional hot and dry climate. They started researching

how to make a seed ball, the perfect size, and the right time to let it dry and make it ready to plant.

In August, students decided to open this event for Grades 6 to 12 of IGCSE and IBDP, where they gave a presentation about Deeply Seeded, why seed bomb is more effective than plantation, and they informed students about various varieties of local seeds, the right way of collecting and storing the same, and process of making the seed balls. All the students from Grades 6 to 12 participated in making these seed bombs, i.e., around 550 seed bombs were made, which they decided to plant near the 'Papad Wale Hanuman Ji' nearby forest area on the 27th of August. Students, teachers, gardeners and administrative staff went along with the students, and they guided and supported them in planting the balls.

Students were delighted to learn and understand the entire process of germination of seeds and plant the same to have a greener and healthier Earth.

It was a great activity as students learned by doing and observing the entire process.
